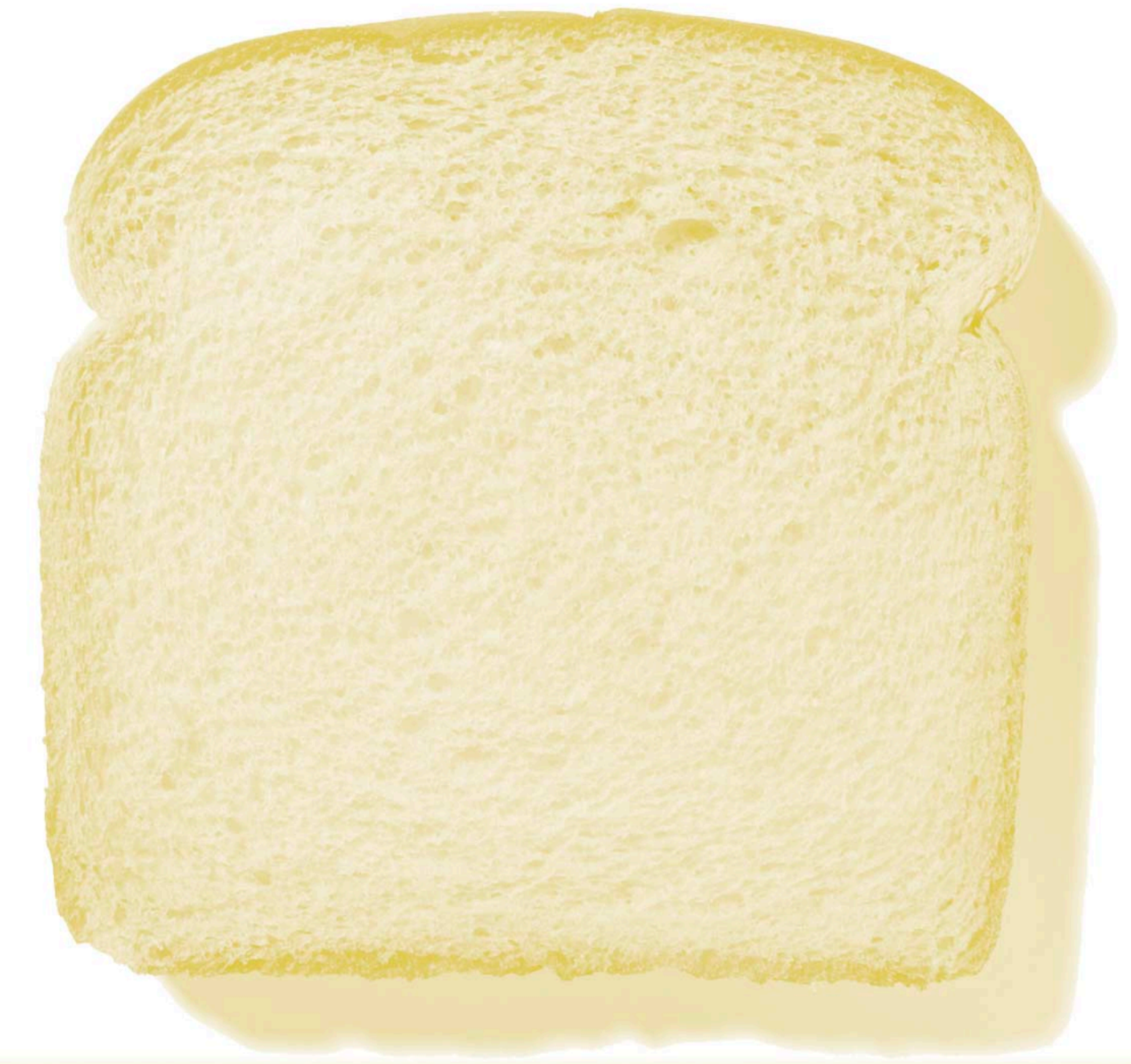

# Salt Dough Sculptures

For years humans have sculpted. Rodin, Michelangelo, Anthony Gormley, Barbara Hepworth, Louise Bourgeois. All famous sculptors. What do they all have in common? They all started sculpting with salt dough (probably). Salt dough has been around since Egyptian times, where they used to make bowls, plates and ornaments from it.

Follow these instructions to make some amazing salt dough sculptures and tableware of your own.

If you need a recipe for salt dough, we suggest:

- 500g plain flour
- 290g table salt
- 350ml tap water
- Mix all the ingredients up in a bowl. Knead it together for 5 mins
- Once you've made your designs, bake them in an oven for 2 hours at 120C.

## Beginner: Candle holder



Take your salt dough.



Tear off a smallish piece like this. About the size of an egg.



Roll the piece of dough around in your hands until you have a ball shape



Take a candle. Push it gently into the top of the dough until it is halfway through the dough.



It should look like this. Bake for 2 hours at 120C. You have a candle holder!

## Intermediate: hand print plate



Take your salt dough.



Tear off a piece that is slightly smaller than your hand.

Squash it flat between your hands as hard as you can.



Take a rolling pin, and roll your squashed piece of dough, really flat.



Roll the dough until it is about 1cm thick.



Press your hand into the dough as hard as you can!



It should look like this! Press it in again if you need to.



Carefully cut around the shape of your hand with a knife



It should look like this! Bake for 2 hours at 120C and will have yourself a hand print plate!

## Expert: Salt dough sculpting

Once your done, bake for 2 hours at 120C, and it should look this this
